The removal of the entry designating September 4th, 2020 as orientation for students entering grades six and nine from the calendar. Not showing on your calendar but 13 also needing to be removed is the parenthetical 14 statement for the entry on September 10th 15 indicating that transportation begins. The third 16 recommended change is adding the designation of 17 Indigenous Peoples Day to October 11th, which 18 will accompany the designation of Columbus Day.

The redesignation of the Wednesdays preceding the end of the first and second quarter, which are Friday November 13th and

Friday January 29th in the first semester as half days for students. These half days would be used for teachers' grade reporting and data analysis; the half days would be November 11th, 2020, and January 27th, 2020. The end of the quarters would remain unchanged. This would allow the end of the quarter half days to coincide with the remote instruction scheduled half day Wednesdays and thereby would have no further impact and 10 reduction of the total number of student contact hours.

12 Also being recommended is the discontinuation of the identification of President's Day and Easter Monday holidays as 15 contingency closure makeup days. These days would be observed as public school holidays. The 17 use of these holidays as contingency makeup days has a fiscal impact on the school system because 19 we are required to pay AFSCME and ESPBC representative employees who work on these days 21 time and a half and holiday pay. In the

2019-2020 school year this represented an expenditure of approximately \$350,000.

Also, we are recommending that two emergency closure days be added to the end of the school year to allow the school system to have five closure makeup days. In accordance with COMAR 13.02.02.04 paragraph C, school calendars must have a minimum of three emergency closure days to make up school days lost to inclement weather or other emergency closures. Should no emergency closures impacting instruction occur, the calendar would be contracted and a new end of school year date identified.

Also, I would like to note that in discussions with the unions it has been agreed that unless a state of emergency were declared by the governor, remote instruction could take place should the school system's workday be delayed or in-person operations be suspended due to inclement weather. If this is request is approved, language to that effect can be

The current state share exceeds \$250 14 million for our projects and just to give you magnitude of scale, in an average year state 16 provides us \$35 to \$45 million for their share of the capital program. For these projects to be 18 funded fully by the state it will take several years at that rate to meet that \$250 million. 20 The county has committed its support for the 21 construction projects that are up to priority

order contained in your request and the complete
design of Lansdowne High School. Any other
projects will be guided by the effort of the
multiyear plan which is under review right now,
and this request for submission to the state has
nothing to do at this point in time by the
development of the multiyear plan. In the future
those projects or recommendations will be
discussed in detail with the Board, with the
administrative committee and with the members of
the community before being added to the capital
program.

This request that you have in front of you is continuation of the previous years' plans. I will go over some of the changes that we have made here and the rationale behind it. The previous years' guiding principles were adding seats, air conditioning projects and improving infrastructure of schools, and that philosophy continues for this plan for fiscal 22. After

that I will give you the background on the

changes that we have made.

So you have two attachments that
Dr. Scriven talked about. One is the complete
plan that was approved for fiscal year 21 and the
other is the proposed plan that we are going to
submit for your approval and then to the state
for fiscal year 22. There are a lot of numbers
in there so to make it simple I would like to
focus your attention for the priority of the
projects so that once you understand then we can
answer any questions you have on the numbers.

So the first thing is that in the last year's plan, priority one which was Berkshire Elementary, priority two which was Colgate Elementary, and priority three was Chadwick Elementary, those projects have already received full funding from the state and have been removed from the submission that you have in front of you for fiscal year 2022.

One of the changes that we have made is changing the priority of Red House Run Elementary
