But now 17 is the time to show our educators in a tangible 18 way.

Last year the five union leaders stood behind Dr. Williams and supported a budget that gave no steps and a one percent COLA, because we did not know how the pandemic would affect

8 to this Board that our educators should not get

that entire two percent COLA beginning in July

2021. With everything that our educators went

through this year, the very least you can do is

show them that you value all their time, effort

and their commitment to our students.

14 The difference between two percent in January and two percent in July for TABCO is less 16 than \$7 million; for all five bargaining units it is less than 10 million. That is less than one half of one percent of the budget. It is unconscionable that we even have to bring this up. Given that over \$337 million will be received by BCPS in federal grant money, there

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surely can be a way to find this money for our employees. In a \$2 billion budget there simply must be a way to show our educators that they are valued and we want to keep them in BCPS teaching our students. Pay our educators the two percent COLA beginning in July. While they deserve far more than this for all they do, they certainly deserve no less. Thank you.

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15 MR. DAICHMAN: Good afternoon. I'm the administrator of the Orchard Hill Nursing Home 17 located at 111 West Road. The nursing home has

135 beds and was acquired about three years ago.

The nursing home is very committed to improve patient care and the community as a whole. We

have spent millions of dollars to renovate the

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facility and upgraded most of the facility, ² including patient rooms and creating a brand new therapy gym.

I am speaking tonight to discuss an issue that the whole area has, which is a significant parking problem. Our patients, families, visitors and employees spend lots of time trying to find parking, and some visitors don't come to the facility to visit their loved ones during certain times because of this problem. Sometimes staff cannot start their shift at the beginning of their shift due to the time of the shift.

We are asking for a parcel of land at the end of Carver School behind the tennis courts that is about 30 feet wide and 250 feet long to add additional parking. This parking could help alleviate the street parking issue suffered by the entire community by taking about 30 cars off the street. That is a very significant ²¹ improvement that would help all the neighboring

Page 127 businesses as well as the school. In fact, this new parking can also be used by the school at nights and weekends.

People have mentioned that the parcel of land would take the entire hill behind the tennis courts. In fact the parking lot would continue in a parallel line to the existing retaining wall next to the baseball diamond and would still leave most of the hill. However, since part of the hill would be taken and we have been told that the hill is used for training, the facility would be willing to create another hill or berm for the students to use.

14 I've heard some concerns that have been raised about designating this parcel as surplus. ¹⁶ One is related environmental concerns and the 17 current LEED certification that the school has. Our team has spoken with engineers who have assured us that this parking lot would not impact our LEED designation and if somehow someone thought it would, there are several ways to

design the parking lot to preserve the LEED 2 status.

Some people have mentioned that the Carver School is already one of the smallest schools in the area and that giving away any land would be avoided because of that fact. I appreciate that concern. However, this plan can be used to alleviate significant parking problems they already have. Removing 30 cars from the street will have a cascading improvement for the 11 whole area.

12 Also, the nursing home is willing to provide several benefits to the school in exchange for this land. Some people have said that the internship program that the nursing home 16 has proposed would not be of interest to the students or convenient to the students because the students prefer to do community service and internship programs around where they live. I am surprised by that because the school is in such close proximity to the nursing home it would be Page 129

very convenient to interested students. I also believe that exposing students to a medical setting can help broaden the experience of the students and expose them to a field they may not be familiar with.

In addition, the nursing home has proposed through previous conversations to purchase or build bleachers for spectators to watch tennis matches as well as provide scholarships to students. We believe this is a win-win-win situation. The nursing facility will be able to add parking which can be used by visitors and staff, which would thereby alleviate much of the problem in the area, and can also be used by students and families on nights and weekends, and the students and the school would receive funding and infrastructure improvement. Many parents and staff are eager to hear about the fall and what will exactly be happening, as well as the latest information on the academic reports. These two very important topics cannot be missed.

The state board of education did not gloss over the glaring failures of our school

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system that we've endured during virtual learning

² from cut curriculum, reduced learning hours to

failing grades and poor attendance rates. This

school board should not ignore it either.

Transparency is what everyone has been asking for but by removing the discussion it shows that you

are hiding something.

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When will parents also get Schoology

back? I've been patiently waiting to turn off

the many daily alerts and currently I cannot

adjust them in any way. Students and staff,

including substitute teachers, have received the

access back, so why not parents? Is anyone in IT

even aware of this? This needs to be made a

priority; it's been nearly seven months and this

is unacceptable at this point.

Parents would also like to know if students can keep their laptops this summer for the six weeks of summer learning Hike program like they did last year. This was incredibly helpful for families who don't have computers or

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have parents who work and need their own computers for their jobs.

What else will BCPS be doing to address the incredible learning loss for this year? Statistics from the state board of education was alarming. BCPS must do better, this must be addressed so kids do not fall further behind their peers in the state and around the country. Every student needs to be brought up to grade level on all subjects and should be challenged to go beyond.

Also, currently kindergarten, sixth and ninth graders who have remained 100 percent virtual this year have missed out on new student orientation. That means in the fall, first, seventh and tenth graders will need to be provided with the opportunity to return to the classrooms without the other grades so they can have an orientation, as they will need more time to adjust to the new building and back to in-person learning after being absent from the

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classroom for over 18 months. These orientations are imperative for these grade levels.

Finally, our schools teach science, 4 don't they? So let's actually use science to ⁵ back up what we're teaching our kids. It's time 6 to remove the masks, a voice for choice. It's too hot and before you have bigger problems on your hands with kids passing out or worse, it's time to get rid of them. Thank you.

school and elementary school failure rates

the third quarter. What impacted these rates?

What is the plan to address this?

Also, why is public comment listed on the agenda as Item Q instead of Item E as in previous meetings? Policies and contracts have already been discussed and voted on prior to the public's input. Public emails are also no longer printed and attached to BoardDocs. How are these 16 two changes in accordance with the participation by the public and community and family engagement 18 policies?

When will the Board of Education meetings be held in person and open for the public to attend? I would gladly be there.

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Baltimore County is currently in the low range or yellow transmission zone according to the CDC. Today's metrics have Baltimore County at 0.9 percent positivity with 1.9 cases per 100,000. ⁵ All of our metrics have been dropping for eight weeks. Most indoor and outdoor capacity restrictions have been lifted in the county and 8 the state.

Please start to have the conversation about removing the mask mandate for children in school. All students over the age of 12 who want the vaccine have now had the opportunity to get it. It scientifically does not matter if children are vaccinated because the rates of the virus have dropped so low. Many other states, even Carroll County right next door, are moving in this direction.

We need to nurture our children, ease their fears related to this virus and promote the safety of schools, encourage them to interact with their peers. We need to restore the human

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connection within our communities. I speak as a parent, a community member and a leader of the Baltimore County Parent Student Coalition. Thank you for your time.

MS. SAROFF: Thank you. Good evening. I first would like to thank BCPS for listening to the voice of the parents in reopening the registration window for the virtual learning academy for the 2021-22 school year.

13 Continuum of service. In the realm of special education it refers to services provided 15 to students with special needs inside and outside general education. A continuum of service is 16 necessary to provide a free and appropriate public education. This year the virtual platform provided a continuum of services to students with special needs along with performing arts classes, magnet classes and AP classes. Virtual learning

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will continue to be offered next year alongside in-person learning but it will not offer a full continuum of service. Virtual learning has opened doors to success for many students with special needs. Some of them are my clients, one of them is my goddaughter. The chat open option provided opportunities for students to participate in their learning and lessening the anxiety around requesting assistance and voicing their knowledge. Breakout rooms provided a distraction for a free environment, provided for one-on-one and small group instruction distraction free in a way that overcrowded ¹⁴ buildings cannot provide. Virtual learning provided more accessibility for students with mobility issues. Many students thrived with 17 special needs on the virtual environment, they thrived better than they did in person. This has been true for students receiving their services in general education as well as self contained

Yet BCPS is making a concerted effort to discourage students with special needs to participate in virtual learning, and I'm not the only one that feels that way. Just today I was told that a parent had difficulty with their IEP 6 team finding out what the continuum of services was going to be for their child in the virtual environment. Parents have been told the only children that should be on the virtual environment is those in general ed. We've all 11 heard the saying if it isn't broken, don't fix it. If the child is currently successful, why are we against continuing to provide the level of service in the least restrictive environment that produced that success? BCPS presently --16 (Audio cut off.) 17 CHAIRWOMAN SCOTT: Thank you. It looks

like our last speaker for general public comment is Meghan Hughes. Ms. Hughes, you can go ahead please.

MS. HUGHES: Yes, thank you. Good

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evening, Dr. Williams and members of the Board. My name is Meghan Hughes. First I want to say thank you to the many board members that voted for finally opening schools four days for middle and high school students at the last board meeting, although tonight I would like to discuss my concern and disappointment for taking 8 reopening off the agenda.

First of all, I'm relieved that my children had a few four-day school weeks before the end of the year, but four days is not fully reopened. Also, in a previous board meeting it was argued that academic reports did not need to be a separate agenda item because it would fall under reopening. Now with reopening off the agenda, will there be no discussion about the third quarter grades? Did you know that there was a tenfold or 1,000 percent increase in failing grades for ELA and math for middle school students compared to third quarter last year? And that's with easier grading practices that

special education classes.

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allowed work to be turned in late and some grades moved from the major-minor category to the practice category. I get that many students had 4 different home situations and this has been a completely crazy year for everyone, so administrators and teachers probably wanted their students to succeed as much as possible given the circumstances.

9 However, what do these academic reports really tell us? We know that they have received follow-up instructional hours this year and I 12 have covered that in previous public comments. Regular curriculum has had to be curtailed due to the reduction in instructional hours and many more kids are failing. From talking to many 16 parents I think so many students were totally checked out from virtual learning; the students are allowed to have their videos off, which most middle and high school students did. Parents said they would find their children logged into their class and playing video games. Many

Page 155 members of the Board had their videos off when their names have been called and it seems like

there's no attention.

My point is that it's pretty easy to disengage or be distracted on virtual learning and I think that's probably one factor in the ⁷ large increase of failing grades. All of this spells disaster for next year. Just recently I heard that Lee Curran, the coordinator for advanced academics GT spoke at a recent meeting and stated that the curriculum philosophy for next year is not remediation but focus on current grade level skills. What about the skills that were missed this year? Many skills, especially ¹⁵ in math and English, are like building blocks; you need the foundational skills to produce the 17 next, and so on. I.e., you need to be able to 18 count to ten before a hundred and before a ¹⁹ thousand. Similarly, you would need to understand the concept of addition before

learning multiplication, and there are concepts

that are covered in C algebra that are required

to be successful in algebra. In writing you need

to understand the concept of nouns and verbs to

4 begin writing sentences and you need to

understand how to write a sentence before writing

a paragraph. I think you all get the idea.

I'm just very concerned about what next year will look like and deeply disappointed that you decided to take reopening off the agenda. Four days is not fully reopened. Even if you believe that four days is fully reopened, you should have kept it on the agenda to specifically discuss and address the latest academic reports. Was this done so you wouldn't have to discuss the failures of this year? Again, I understand this year has been extremely stressful for many and

I'm sure most are looking forward to summer break. However, there needs to be a well

discussed plan for next year so students don't 20 get further and further behind. Thank you.

And what I've experience in the past, not all the time, but intermittent, it's hit or miss, where you need a registered nurse to provide recommendations to the team to get a better understanding of what the child's needs are so they're met, and you don't have the registered nurse participating in the team, and 17 that hurts the child because the child is not getting access to a free and appropriate public education.

So I would request in addition to having ²¹ health services that we dedicate some resources

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to actually train them in the IEP process so they understand how they could benefit a child and better support a child in her school building.

⁴ There's a lot of things that could be added to

⁵ the IEP to help a child that might have something 6 medically related that impacts severely their access to education. And that's what I have to

say about that policy. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN SCOTT: Thank you. Next is Board Policy 5430, psychological services renamed to psychological services and positive behavior supports, and our first speaker is Ms. Sharon Saroff.

MS. SAROFF: Good evening. Again, this 15 is something that I deal with every day with my students. I have multiple clients that do have 16 behavioral concerns and yet the school psychologist isn't providing the direct educational support that these students need to ²⁰ aid positive behavior. We should be having this available to every special education student that

One system improvement team is the PSAT, SAT, ACT, AccuPlacer team, which is comprised of central office and school-based stakeholders who

have been engaged since the beginning of the

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school year in data analysis, reviewing current research, interviewing school and central office personnel and action planning to determine next steps in closing the gaps that have been ⁵ identified related to PSAT. The specific charge of this work group is to determine the current state, analyze current practices and identify conditions for success by the end of the 2021 9 school year.

This slide discusses those specific actions, the work we have taken to begin to understand the current BCPS story related to participation and performance in our current college assessment model, and begin the active process of developing recommendations in response to our system data. Next slide please.

So the preliminary high level findings of the PSAT, SAT, ACT, AccuPlacer system improvement team are as follows: The team has found that there is a variance that exists across schools in how students can access preparation

opportunities. The team also found that there's a lack of standardization at the system level regarding those nonnegotiable items that all schools must engage in preparing students for ⁵ various college entrance assessments. The team also found that there's a variance in how college entrance assessments are communicated and marketed throughout the system. And finally, the team found that there is some variance in professional learning that occurs for counselors and teachers as it relates to educating students and families on their choices for college 13 entrance assessments.

So based on these findings and as a next step, the SIT group will draft and deliver to the superintendent recommendations with a goal of actualization for the upcoming school year to insure that we are moving forward with urgency to improve student performance and participation on college entrance assessments and specifically the SAT. Thank you for your time to allow us to

provide this important information, and I will turn it back to Dr. Wheatley-Phillip who will then close us out.

As Dr. Minus mentioned, the ACT is another option, the AccuPlacer for community schools. Those are things we want to look at to help guide our

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students in terms of what their options, what ² they want to do after high school, and then what assessments they should take or prepare to take 4 so they can get into the courses, but just ⁵ because a student has an IEP does not mean that 6 they should not take the PSAT or SAT, they should, and we went to the College Board for accommodations. We will be happy to follow up with additional information regarding that.

The BCPS cyber attack has greatly impacted our ability to retrieve, collect and report performance data, specifically our ability to use specific data points to track our progress. Collaboration across divisions is helping to identify what data are available, the relevance, and what insights can be drawn. On the next slide Dr. Minus will provide a high level overview of the office progress plans.

So office progress plans are the process by which departments and offices are engaged in continuous improvement, so this slide displays the office progress plan progress ⁵ monitoring system through action steps, professional learning and monitoring metrics. So ⁷ for the current year 54 office progress plans ⁸ have been developed, which is a hundred percent increase compared to last year's office scorecards. Presently office heads are completing progress monitoring and the action steps and monitoring metrics. Due to the BCPS ¹³ cyber attack, nine of the office progress plans requiring revisions are in the process of developing adaptive metrics and learning plans. ¹⁶ However, the majority of the OPPs, which are 45, 17 were minimally impacted and are on track to 18 complete the end of the year data reporting for action steps and implementation of professional learning as part of the three-year continuous improvement cycle. It was truly wonderful to celebrate them in person with family members or friends, and to really ⁵ just honor them for making this achievement 6 happen in the midst of all of these challenges. ⁷ I also appreciate the hard work of staff, both BCPS and Towson University that made these celebrations happen and happen very similar to the way we've always done them the last several years, so it was truly a special moment.

I would also like for the superintendent to provide an update related to the timing of

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schoolhouse leadership deciding what's best for their schoolhouse. Last year the decision to change to semesters did not happen until the first week of August, and in my opinion there's always time to make the best decisions for our students and to receive that input which by policy the Board says it is interested in 8 receiving.

So from a student perspective we're going to have students entering buildings that have not been in for 17 months. We have students who are returning to schools five days a week, some of them which they have not experienced for 17 months. Some of the high schools, students will not have set foot in their building prior to the first day of school in 2021-2022. From a teacher perspective related to the semester benefits is the opportunity to only teach three classes each semester, thereby fostering better relationships with students and getting to know them so that they can really identify any issues
