And the next item on the agenda is the report on the Phase III and the reentry plan, and for that I call on Dr. McComas and the community superintendents.

DR. WILLIAMS: So good evening, we have a team like you said Chairwoman Scott, we have a team with us tonight, Dr. McComas, Ms. Byers, Dr. Jones and Dr. Roberts. So good evening to the Board, Chairwoman Scott and Vice Chair Henn.

As you're aware, on September 16th, ¹² 2020, the Maryland State Department of Education ¹³ approved the reopening plan for Baltimore County ¹⁴ Public Schools. That plan in accordance with ¹⁵ Maryland Tomorrow, sorry, excuse me, Maryland ¹⁶ Together, the Maryland State Department of ¹⁷ Education recovery plan focuses on promoting the 18 health, welfare and safety of our students, staff ¹⁹ and families, while maximizing learning. This

evening we will provide the Board with

²¹ information regarding return of all students in a

hybrid setting. Next slide please.

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So as outlined in our MSDE-approved plan posted on December 16th, 2020, our hybrid approach will prioritize bringing identified and targeted students back for in-person instruction on a rotating basis, while still offering the parents the choice of a full-time virtual learning approach. As outlined on this slide, Baltimore County Public Schools created a plan that would phase in small groups of students through a targeted prioritized manner.

Our phased-in approach begins with the students in our public separate day schools. The detailed plan for our public separate day schools was posted to our website on November 4th, 2020. 16 It is incorporated in the BCPS reentry plan as Appendix K.

Phase II in our approach includes all students in preschool through grade two, regardless of their least restrictive environment. The plan for Phase II was published

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on our website on November 11th, 2020 as Appendix M.

Phase III will bring back two groups of students. They include our special ed students ⁵ in grades three through 12 whose least restrictive environment is outside of the general education classroom setting. In addition in this phase, students in select CTE programs would reenter school based on the need for hands-on instruction aligned to credentialing.

Finally, our plan outlines that in Phase IV all students in grades three through 12 regardless of their least restrictive environment, would reenter school through a 15 hybrid model.

Understanding that the request was made for all students to return to hybrid by second semester, the timeline for implementation for reentry of student groups is contingent upon the status of our public metrics are and through consultation with the Baltimore County Health

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Department. Additionally, some technology systems affected by the ransomware attack could impact the implementation of components of the phased-in plan. The remainder of this presentation will highlight components of plans for Phases III and IV. Next slide please.

MS. BYERS: Thank you, Dr. Williams, and good evening, Madam Chair and members of the board. Consistent with our plans for Phase I and Phase II, the plans for Phase III and Phase IV are organized into three parts.

Part one, health and safety, address several components that are related to the physical and social-emotional health of our students and our staff. They include health metrics, mitigation strategies, screening, PPE, ventilation, health services protocols, safety plans and drills for our schools, and social-emotional learning.

Part two of the plans for Phase III and Phase IV, system and school operations, speak to

how we're going to address things like
determining hybrid or virtual instruction through
a questionnaire process, our cohort development
process, pick-up and drop-off procedures for our
parents, transportation, food and nutrition,
attendance and hybrid models, and how we will
establish procedures for visitors to our
buildings.

Both part one and part two of the plans
for Phases III three and IV also address the way
that we provide support to many of our members of
AFSCME, specifically our building service
workers, our bus drivers and our staff in food
and nutrition. This is in regard to their
training in mitigation strategies in their
respective fields. We continue to be
appreciative of these staff members who have been
on the front line since the very beginning, and
as we begin to return groups of students and
increase the number of students who are returning

in a hybrid model, we will continue to provide

them with supports and professional learning that is necessary for the duties of their job.

3 And then finally, part three of the plan are components that address the delivery of teaching and learning and how it will impact staff and students, so those components include things like class assignments and staff considerations, cohort changes, school schedule, materials that are used in a hybrid setting, the instructional materials that we use, any modifications that will have to be made to the synchronous instructional model, general expectations for teachers and for students. This part of the plan will include information on how to provide ESOL services in a hybrid model, and 16 special education services in a hybrid model. Additionally, it will speak to assessment practices while we return groups of students, how we staff substitutes and temporary employees, and then also how classrooms will be laid out.

So the remainder of this presentation is

going to highlight components of Phases III and IV, but really through the lens of the different stakeholder groups that are impacted. And so at this time I am going to turn things over to my colleague Dr. Boswell-McComas, and she is going to walk us through the next portion of the presentation. Dr. McComas?

DR. MCCOMAS: Yes, thank you, Ms. Byers, and good evening, Dr. Williams, Chair Scott and members of the Board. As we move into Phase III it's important to recognize that we will continue to build upon the hybrid model that you see in front of you, and that we introduced in earlier phases of our plan. And of course, all instruction will still be anchored to Maryland college and career standards, and provide services to students receiving special education and ESOL services.

So just very quickly to remind everybody, in our standard model here what we have is families that choose to send their

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Page 74 students to hybrid will participate in Cohort A ² or Cohort B and will attend in-person instruction ³ as you see on the screen in front of you, either ⁴ on Monday and Tuesday or on Thursday and Friday. ⁵ Families who choose Cohort C are choosing to ⁶ remain virtual throughout the entire instructional week. And so just to refresh everybody's memory, that's our standard universal model for hybrid at this point. If we could go to the next slide?

11 Thank you. As part of Phase III, we begin to introduce our students representing special education services outside of the general education program, often we refer to these commonly as our regional programs and these are 16 very specialized programs for students. What you have in front of you is a sample regional program schedule for students at the high school level and I just want to walk through what an ²⁰ instructional day would look like for the student, and they would begin their day with

functional skills, class meetings, they would engage in self help skills, communication skills. daily living skills, transitional skills. That would of course be followed by an English ⁵ language arts block or content that could also be science, social studies or health, followed by a course of lunch opportunity during the day followed up with math, again another content area, and you will see some of the specific ideas that could be incorporated into that instructional block, and of course any special areas or electives that they may be participating in. If we could go to the next slide please.

Here you will see a very similar model, this is for our middle school students in our regional program sample model, and you'll find that it follows very closely to the high school schedule. You'll see in there some transitional activities as well. Again, if we could go to the next slide?

And lastly, here we have an elementary

sample schedule. Again, you will see that their day unfolds in a very reliable and routine manner, so fixing of course instructional blocks on ELA and math interspersed with the other content areas and special areas as appropriate for their grade level and rotation.

So along with our special education students receiving services and our regional programs in Phase III, we also begin to return some CTE students in very specific programs. The programs that you see on the screen in front of you are programs in which our students need ¹³ hands-on opportunity with equipment and training to be able to meet the credentials, the hours of hand-on training to meet the credentials for 16 their specific programs, and so we will begin offering that opportunity for our students in this space. These students would actually attend on Wednesdays for that opportunity, and we know that they're excited to have that opportunity to finish their credentialing.

DR. ROBERTS: Great, thank you,

So due to the complexity of scheduling students in grades six through 12, the cohort process will follow a different process than Phase I through III for Phase IV. So for Phase ⁹ IV all students in grades six through 12 will have an in-person schedule created by their schools. The students will then be cohorted into two groups, Cohort A and Cohort B as Dr. Boswell-McComas just mentioned. They will be ¹⁴ cohorted by home address; this will allow siblings to attend school on the same day. Schools will then conduct an analysis of the 17 cohorts to identify any potential issues that

Once schools receive the responses from ²¹ Phase III and IV questionnaires, they will

would impact established mitigation strategies

and then balance as needed.

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complete a second analysis to create a Cohort C
and these students would be students who remain
virtual 100 percent of the time. Schools will
then rebalance Cohorts A and B to insure proper
mitigation strategies are maintained for those
students choosing to return to a hybrid model.
Lastly, schools will then notify families
regarding which cohort their child or their
children will be assigned to in Phase IV. Next
slide please.

For Phase IV, a concurrent learning model will be used in a developmentally appropriate way. Current learning means that students who are in person and students learning virtually will participate in the same learning experience with the teacher. How this is done and how often this model is used will vary depending on the age and grade level of the students, as concurrent learning is more developmentally appropriate for different lengths of time and in different ways based on the

student's age, grade and content being taught. Next slide please.

Comprehensive student support continues
to be a cornerstone of BCPS's reopening plan in
Phases III and IV, including updated and enhanced
student support measures to insure each student
can maximize their learning. This slide will
focus on three areas of student support including
instructional, social-emotional and technology.

Some of the instructional supports for
our students as we enter Phase III and IV will
include or continue to include tutoring provided
by teachers and/or peer-to-peer tutoring at the
secondary level; office hours on asynchronous
day; small group learning opportunities
throughout the week on synchronous and
asynchronous days; and lastly, extracurricular
activities, so some examples being our student
government associations, the multiple honor
societies offered at the secondary level and
CTE-related programs.

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A myriad of social-emotional support, learning supports for our students would include or continue to include individual, group or family counseling, where students and their families can take advantage of counseling services offered by our trained BCPS staff; classroom lessons specifically tailored towards academic and social-emotional learning; home visits and wellness checks by our school climate office staff to provide at-home supports for students; utilization of BCPS virtual calming rooms; and mentoring programs available for all students within the system. And lastly, signs of suicide prevention curriculum. This is a universal curriculum school-based prevention 16 program designed for middle school and high school students, with some of those essential goals being to decrease suicides and suicide attempts by increasing student knowledge and adaptive attitudes about depression, encouraging personal help seeking or health seeking on behalf

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of their friends, reduce the stigma of mental illness and acknowledging importance of seeking help or treatment, engaging our parents and school staff as partners in the prevention through gatekeeper education, and lastly, encouraging schools to develop community-based partnerships to support student mental health.

With respect to technology supports for our students, some of those will include Google Meets hosted by system and school-based student groups, tech time to address student tech support, and lastly, continuing our ticketing system to support students with their technology questions.

At this time we will hand the presentation over to Dr. Jones, who will share information related to supports for our school-based leaders and staff. Dr. Jones?

DR. JONES: Thank you, Dr. Roberts. Our school-based leaders are a very important part of and very important partners in the work of

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times.

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educating students. Just as students are at the
center of all we do, reopening would not be
possible without our Team BCPS school leaders,
teachers, support staff and all those who support
the many many aspects of instructing students.
School leaders are provided with professional
learning, instructional leadership support and
operational supports, and that has been the case
throughout the pandemic. These supports align
with the efforts and current work of leading
through a pandemic. Our principals have
demonstrated resilience and continue to
courageously lead in this, in these challenging

In addition to meeting monthly with our

Superintendent Dr. Darryl Williams and him

providing us with a message, there are also

updates that are provided to our school leaders.

In addition, our executive directors and

community superintendents meet weekly with our

principals to check in and provide any type of

weekly update or really just check in to see how our principals are doing.

Further, we collaborate with the Division of Organizational Development and ⁵ Effectiveness to offer a plethora of professional 6 learning opportunities, and throughout all of the phases, these continual, these professional learning opportunities will continue. Currently BCP Connects is a series of coaching workshops that focus on training for open conversation, which allows our leaders and school staff to process current events. We also use positive reinforcement and we think about things like ¹⁴ noticing, mindfulness and action. Equity professional learning communities and conversations about race and the impact of COVID-19 is also an important topic of discussion 17 that has required follow-up action as our leaders service their communities. With all of this in mind, our leaders are provided with suggested

strategies to help with self care, as well as

ideas to keep BCPS students, staff and families connected each week.

3 Regarding operational support with reopening and throughout all the phases, COVID-19 guidance and support has been provided, the development, maintenance and distribution of up-to-date mitigation guidance for BCPS, identification and procurement of necessary PPE for staff, which was developed in partnership with Baltimore County Government to assist with the implementation of health and safety measures within Baltimore County Public Schools. Our county executive announced a special effort authorizing the purchase of PPE and cleaning supplies for use in all BCPS schools; this effort is funded by the federal CARES Act grant and products are embedded and are in compliance with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention requirements. Each principal received a per student allocation based on 2019 enrollment for their school in support of the purchase for PPE Page 85

Page 83 and cleaning supplies, and principals will be

ready to use these items with staff and students

when it is safe to do so.

The last thing we want to share about
the operational support with our principle is
that safety managers are assigned to each zone to
provide ongoing staff support and conduct student
wellness checks throughout the coronavirus
pandemic. And as we all know, our high school
principals are working very closely with DOIT in
collaborating to distribute and re-image devices
along with the tremendous support and assistance
from our elementary and middle school principals.
Next slide please.

Again, it is very important that we continue to think about the work that is happening within our schools and that work is also very important as it relates to our teaching staff. School-based staff receives support in three important areas and this will continue to be the case throughout Phases III and IV,

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professional learning, social-emotional support for adults and technical supports. Some of these supports were mentioned earlier, but we want to 4 just make sure that everyone is aware that there are targeted supports through C&I, organizational development, and our Division of School Climate and Safety. C&I provides our teachers, our special education teachers, advanced academics, ESOL, early childhood, college and career readiness educational options and so many other offerings to make sure that our teachers are able to instruct our students in a virtual setting and in a hybrid model. Our health services providers, school nurses and school counselors are also provided with targeted professional learning to provide supports to staff, students and families remotely, and will be able to do so in a hybrid model as we enter each phase of 19 reopening.

Social-emotional supports for our adults are also very important. There is training

Page 87 around coaching for student engagement but also thinking about that supportive relationship and building connections between teachers and students. We have our employee assistance program that is available for our staff members and again, we're just very excited about all of the partnerships that we do have to make sure that our teachers, our students, our leaders and all are socially and emotionally taken care of 10 during this time.

Technical supports for our teachers include training for Microsoft 365 and Google Meets. We also have some trainings that are school based that allow for professional development as it relates to the instructional tools that are needed to make sure our students get what they need during remote learning and this will also take place during hybrid learning.

At this time I will turn it back over to Ms. Byers. Thank you.

MS. BYERS: Thank you, Dr. Jones. In

preparation for Phases III and IV, multiple

supports have been offered to our BCPS families

and we will need to continue to do that. The

graphic on the slide in front of you represents

really wraparound services that we are able to

provide for our families, and we depicted it this

way because it truly represents the ongoing

wraparound supports that are needed, because just

like our students and all of our staff,

social-emotional supports have been and will

continue to need to be available to our families.

So while these are in no specific order in terms

of priority, I am going to work my way clockwise

14 around the graphic.

15 So again, social-emotional supports for 16 families are essential and some of them have already been mentioned this evening. But just to give you an example of one type of support that we offer, we utilize a youth mental health first aid, this is in an evidence-based training program that is designed to teach adults how they

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can recognize and help adolescents who may be

experiencing a mental health issue, perhaps an

addiction or is in crisis, and offices within our

Department of Social-Emotional Supports work

collaboratively to help with this youth mental

health first aid. That includes our Office of

School Social Workers, Office of School

Counselors, our psychological services, pupil

personnel services and our Office of Health

10 Services.

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Additionally, we support our families through system and school outreach. Our Office of Family and Community Engagement collaborates with our schools to plan and share important information for our parents and guardians who are in need of help and additional supports. An 17 important and critical role that our school-based staff plays is making sure that our families feel connected to their school communities, so oftentimes they will collaborate with our Office of Family and Community Engagement, and that's

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critical so that they're able to provide
workshops and offerings to their families that
might be unique because they meet the unique
needs of a specific school community, and they're
able to advertise these through their
newsletters, their websites, their PTAs, social
media and other avenues. We also know that our
BCPS parent university is a critical component of
our system outreach. They have and continue to
offer free virtual workshops to our families and
to our staff, and all of that can be found on our
parent university site.

So again, we know that it's important to

partner with our community, so again, part of our

system's outreach is also the way we work with

different organizations within our community. We

have specific mental health partnerships between

school and community mental health providers, and

so that's just another way that our system

reaches out in terms of finding ways to be able

to support family.

Page 91 1 Technical and technology supports are ongoing and they're going to remain ongoing as we move into this hybrid model for each of the phases of reopening. So we will work to continue ⁵ to provide families with those supports, links 6 for accessing instruction for teaching and 7 learning tools such as Google Meets and our Schoology learning management system can be found on our website, and there are lots of support resources for families that continue to be developed specifically as we work through this repair phase from the ransomware attack, and so families can always look to the website for new ¹⁴ and different resources as we move through that 15 phase.

And then finally, as has been previously explained, in terms of instructional models, as we move into Phases III and IV, families are going to continue to have choices with the instructional model that works best for their students and their family. They will receive a

questionnaire which will allow them to make a selection with regard to how they would like their students to engage as we move into Phases III and IV, whether that be in a hybrid model which will provide face-to-face opportunities or if they would like to continue to remain fully virtual. Additionally, the plans for Phases III and IV do lay out a process for families in the event that they would like to change the model that they have selected. We know that circumstances can and do change as we are navigating and as our families are navigating through this global pandemic.

And so with that, in closing, again, this BCPS phased-in approach for reopening is really designed to bring back targeted small groups of students. This evening's presentation did provide highlights for our stakeholders for Phases III and IV, and again, this approach is designed to sequentially return students through a staggered approach when it is safe to do so.

So consistent with Phases I and II, the detailed

plans, there will be a plan for Phase III and a plan for Phase IV, will be published to our website following winter break. BCPS will continue to communicate with our schools and our families regarding the questionnaire, so that we can begin that critical planning and implementation that's necessary as we work through the different phases of reentry, and with specific dates for return for each group, again,

Our results from our parents or guardians of students who are pre-K through 4 grade two indicated more than half in each grade ⁵ intend to send their students back to the school ⁶ building part time for hybrid learning. Students with unique programming needs will require alternatives to virtual learning. Students are missing the interactions with their classmates

11 Our health officials are working with us to monitor the COVID-19 data and the metrics from the Maryland Health Department. Our health officials work with our team to monitor the data, discuss cases and research. Our health officials with the COVID-19 task force continue to monitor 16 specific data for Baltimore County and when it is safe to do so, we will begin to bring back small groups of students. Our nurses and health technicians have provided the expertise to our larger Baltimore community and are preparing for

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Our staff members have been working hard since March 13th, 2020, and even harder since September 8th, the first day of school, and again, December 2nd when we reconnected our students with staff. Our administrators have ⁷ been responsive to the school communities and have worked to keep students and staff connected. Our building service workers, food and nutrition staff and even transportation staff have been working since March 13th. Our paraprofessional staff members have been supporting our schools, our staff and administrators and communities. ¹⁴ And our IT staff have been extremely busy these past several weeks and continue to help us problem solve and address issues. Staff members 17 are missing their students and their colleagues. 18

Teachers and staff are needed for the ¹⁹ hybrid model and the phased-in approach. We have shared options for teachers and our central office staff and school-based leaders have

prepared our phased-in approach, including mitigation strategies. As reported, our county executive funded additional resources for PPE, 4 hand sanitizers, other equipment and supplies,

and we collaborated to open several academic support centers. We are looking at alternatives for

students for second semester by capitalizing our learning with our reengagement model from the spring and summer. And we know that the first round of vaccines will probably go to the hospitals of course, nursing homes and assisted living facilities, the healthcare workers and emergency personnel. It is my hope and advocacy of all of us that our educators and 16 administrators will be high on that list. Our priority throughout this process is the health and safety of students and staff. We know that we have families who are anxious to have students return and we have familiar who are nervous about students returning. We want to bring students

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Page 97 back but need to continue to allow the health and safety of our students and staff guide the decision making process. This phased-in approach will allow us to bring back students in a sequential way insuring that our students for whom virtual learning is difficult are prioritized. Our staggered approach allows us to insure that we are successful with each phase, time to evaluate, and safely bring back groups of 10 students.

WILLIAMS: So our team and our principals -- let me answer the question, yes. ¹⁰ Our team and our principals have been working diligently regarding the mitigation strategies. ¹² As you know, we had our phased-in process. The one thing that we have to keep in consideration ¹⁴ are the logistics because of what we have, ¹⁵ limited access in developing schedules, looking at transportation may take a little bit longer than we anticipated because we are a little bit 18 handicapped. However, to answer your question, we were ready to go with Phase I back in November and we paused based on the metrics, and so we are

continuing being advised and we continue to meet

weekly with our Baltimore County Health ² Department, and we're monitoring the metrics to

make sure we are safe to bring back small groups of students.

MR. KUEHN: Okay. So are the buildings -- from what you said, the buildings are ready for students to come back?

DR. WILLIAMS: Well, when we talk about our phases, we were prepared for Phase I and Phase II. We will continue to do the work. Our principals have the resources as was described earlier with the PPE. What will probably delay us is really defining the schedules and the logistics as Ms. Byers and team shared. So when you say ready, it's more than just the buildings, 16 we have to have all the components to prepare for the return, just like we have to prepare our 18 staff for the return.

19 MR. KUEHN: All right, thank you. Have you made a request as the county executive has and I believe the Superintendent of Schools for

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Maryland, to make the vaccine available to students and school -- I'm sorry -- to teachers and school staff members?

DR. WILLIAMS: So because the State Department of Education made that request, we had a conversation, we the local superintendents, and ⁷ so we were advocating for that, and we're just waiting to see where our educators, administrators will fall on that list. But having been close to a health professional, of course you know I'm married to one, the priority which makes sense and I get it, are health professionals in the hospitals and other ¹⁴ facilities. So the request has been made, we're 15 just waiting to see what the approval will be, and then when that timeline will also be. I 17 don't know those answers at this time.

MR. KUEHN: And Dr. Williams, in order to hit the date and actually make decisions for things to start happening, which date are you going to provide, which date are you going to say

Page 106 we are going to move forward on reopening on the second semester, or we're not going to and we're going to have to delay by X amount of time? What

date will that decision be made?

DR. WILLIAMS: So I can't give you a date because the health metrics are driving that. We do know the start of second semester, we have been advised to continue with a phased-in approach versus bringing back all kids pre-K to 12, so unfortunately that will be an update that we will have to provide as we continue to monitor 12 the metrics.

I ⁸ hear what you're saying, I think if students are finding success, that's a good thing. Also, I do feel that some kind of interactions or something else where they could interact with other activities would be important, so I won't say we are ready to do that beginning the second semester, but it is worth looking and exploring just to see how successful our students are experiencing, and as you mentioned, we've had 17 great success with Spark where students can gain credit for courses that they need for graduation, so that's been successful. I think there's some opportunities, believe it or not, from what we've

learned from virtual learning that we can start

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exploring as a system. Thank you for that.

MR. MUHUMUZA: Yeah, and I'm just saying that I would love to see some type of report update in the future, but not in the plan, just your intention to explore it, and that was it.

My next question I believe was for Dr. Roberts or one of the community superintendents. In terms of extracurriculars and cocurriculars being offered in high school, I believe a month or so ago, or no, actually it was 11 the beginning of virtual learning, I believe I asked how many clubs or what kinds of clubs are ¹³ being offered virtually. And I think you stated that each school might be different, and I don't want to put words in your mouth, but you said 16 each school might be different, and athletics would continue virtually, and some other clubs like student council. And I'm just curious to know, can you provide, is it possible to provide some kind of report showing each school, the number of clubs they're offering?

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DR. WILLIAMS: So I think that's a good followup for us, Mr. Muhumuza, that we can provide that information working with our school principals to finalize the list.

MR. MUHUMUZA: Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN SCOTT: Great, thank you for that, and next we have Dr. Hager.

DR. HAGER: Yes. Thank you for the update on the reopening plan. I have two questions that are actually quite similar to
