U.S. News & World Report ranks BCPS high schools among best in state and nation

Eastern Tech named best high school in Maryland, Western Tech named 8th best

Towson, Md. – Baltimore County's public high schools placed well in the annual U.S. News & World Report's Best High Schools list released today, with five placing among the top 30 high schools in the state, 14 among the top 150, three among the state's top five magnet schools, and four among the nation's best magnet schools.

Eastern Technical High School and Western School of Technology and Environmental Science led the way for Baltimore County Public Schools, ranking first and eighth respectively among high schools in Maryland and first and fourth respectively among the state's magnet schools. George Washington Carver Center for Arts and Technology came in 13th on the state's best high school list and fifth among all magnet schools in Maryland. Eastern Tech was ranked 33rd on the national list of magnet schools, while Western Tech was ranked 80th.

Seven Baltimore County public high schools ranked among the top 60 in Maryland. They are Eastern Tech, Western Tech, Carver Center, Towson High School, Hereford High School, Pikesville High School, and Catonsville High School. Eastern Tech and Western Tech were named the Baltimore Metro region's top two high schools.

"We are proud, as always, of the achievements of the students and staff of our high schools," said BCPS Superintendent Dr. Myriam Rogers. "We are especially pleased this year to see so many of our schools rise in the U.S. News & World Report rankings. We celebrate these results while we continue working to ensure that all our students are learning and growing at schools that are the best in Maryland and the nation."

The BCPS high schools that received rankings on the U.S. News & World report are:

The U.S. News rankings include data on nearly 25,000 public high schools in 50 states and the District of Columbia. Rankings are based on college readiness (counting for 30 percent of the U.S. News score), state assessment proficiency (20 percent), state assessment performance (20 percent), underserved student performance (10 percent), college curriculum breadth (10 percent), and graduation rate (10 percent). Factored into the rankings were participation and achievement in Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate courses.
